Common Challenge 3

Initiating a participatory and integrated governance model

1) The need for a development and a reinforcement of civil societies in China and in Europe.

The protection for fundamental civil human rights and the development of these civil societies to develop a capacity to generate change in different kind of situations in China and in Europe. It also means development of citizens training (peasants, consumers....)

2) Regional, national, local political institutions that open up to allow different stakeholders of the civil society and to work together to face common issues at stake.

3) One of the common political responsibilities of the political elite, intellectual sphere, the medias, and of the civil society is :

-to respect the possibility for the different ethnic and social groups to participate, to have access to fundamental rights, to avoid their marginalisation and their stigmatisation.

- To promote development coming from the base of these societies

Address inequality in the domain of education by establishing a system and procedures of democratic management that would guide, evaluate and monitor efforts of governments, professionals, educators and the medias.

4) A model of governance that binds social and environmental emergency, creating a new economy.

5) States, together with civil societies, that impose a social and environmental responsibility to corporations, in a legal framework.

6) The respect of a precaution principle related to the well being of local population and their management of the commons when initiating economical projects, new equipments and infrastructure.

7) - The respect for difference between China and Europa, in a process of mutual dialogue and
